**Celebrant:** Blessed is the King who comes in the name of the Lord!

**People:** **Peace in heaven and glory in the highest!**

Assist us mercifully with your help, O Lord God of our salvation, that we may enter with joy upon the contemplation of those mighty acts, whereby you have given us life and immortality; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

### THE PALM GOSPEL

**LUKE 19:28-40**

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

**People: Glory to you, Lord Christ.**

Jesus went on ahead, going up to Jerusalem. When he had come near Bethphage and Bethany, at the place called the Mount of Olives, he sent two of the disciples, saying, "Go into the village ahead of you, and as you enter it you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden. Untie it and bring it here. If anyone asks you, 'Why are you untying it?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it.'" So those who were sent departed and found it as he had told them. As they were untying the colt, its owners asked them, "Why are you untying the colt?" They said, "The Lord needs it." Then they brought it to Jesus; and after throwing their cloaks on the colt, they set Jesus on it. As he rode along, people kept spreading their cloaks on the road. As he was now approaching the path down from the Mount of Olives, the whole multitude of the disciples began to praise God joyfully with a loud voice for all the deeds of power that they had seen, saying, "Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord! Peace in heaven, and glory in the highest heaven!" Some of the Pharisees in the crowd said to him, "Teacher, order your disciples to stop." He answered, "I tell you, if these were silent, the stones would shout out."

The Gospel of the Lord.

### THE BLESSING OF THE PALMS

The People hold up their palm branches for the blessing

**Celebrant:** The Lord be with you.

On this day he entered the holy city of Jerusalem in triumph, and was proclaimed as King of kings by those who spread their garments and branches of palm along his way.

### The Liturgy of Palm Sunday

Today we begin the great journey with Jesus to his passion, death, and resurrection, and we hope that this commemoration of our Lord's entry into Jerusalem is a meaningful part of your observance of Holy Week and Easter.

The Liturgies of Holy Week are full of drama, movement, symbolic action, and remembrance. They all fit together into an entire liturgical experience, and they offer profound riches to those who give themselves to the entire cycle of Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Easter Eve, and Easter Day. It may seem like a lot of church for one week, but these services bring us to the heart of our Christian faith, and we shall never begin to understand that faith unless we are willing to walk with Jesus now. As you enter into the mystery of this week, let the actions, words, symbols, music and drama carry you along. Little by little, step by step, the truths that Holy Week reveals to us become a part of our living conversation with God.

Our Holy Week services first took shape in fourth-century Jerusalem after the time of Constantine, when it became possible for Christians to worship at the sites which have been traditionally associated with Jesus' last days, and these observances were taken by pilgrims back to their churches at home.

The Liturgy of Palm Sunday begins on a triumphant note, as we bless palms and remember the cheering crowds who welcomed Jesus into Jerusalem. But very quickly we are reminded, in the reading of the Passion Gospel, that this same crowd had turned against Jesus by the end of the week.

Celebrant: Let these branches be for us signs of his victory, and grant that we who bear them in his name may ever hail him as our King, and follow him in the way that leads to eternal life; who lives and reigns in glory with you and the Holy Spirit, now and for ever.

**People: Amen.**

Celebrant: Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!

**People: Hosanna in the highest.**

## THE PROCESSION

Celebrant: Let us go forth in peace.

**People: In the name of Christ. Amen.**

Almighty and everliving God, in your tender love for the human race you sent your Son our Savior Jesus Christ to take upon him our nature, and to suffer death upon the cross, giving us the example of his great humility: Mercifully grant that we may walk in the way of his suffering, and also share in his resurrection; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

### A READING FROM THE LETTER OF PAUL TO THE PHILIPPIANS

2:5-11

Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death—even death on a cross. Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

## THE PASSION OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST ACCORDING TO LUKE 23:1-56

*The customary responses before and after the Gospel  
are omitted this day. Please be seated.*

Then the assembly rose as a body and brought Jesus before Pilate. They began to accuse him, saying, "We found this man perverting our nation, forbidding us to pay taxes to the emperor, and saying that he himself is the Messiah, a king." Then Pilate asked him, "Are you the king of the Jews?" He answered, "You say so." Then Pilate said to the chief priests and the crowds, "I find no basis for an accusation against this man." But they were insistent and said, "He stirs up the people by teaching throughout all Judea, from Galilee where he began even to this place." When Pilate heard this, he asked whether the man was a Galilean. And when he learned that he was under Herod's jurisdiction, he sent him off to Herod, who was himself in Jerusalem at that time. When Herod saw Jesus, he was very glad, for he had been wanting to see him for a long time, because he had heard about him and was hoping to see him perform some sign. He questioned him at some length, but Jesus gave him no answer. The chief priests and the scribes stood by, vehemently accusing him. Even Herod with his soldiers treated him with contempt and mocked him; then he put an elegant robe on him, and sent him back to Pilate. That same day Herod and Pilate became friends with each other; before this they had been enemies.

Pilate then called together the chief priests, the leaders, and the people, and said to them, "You brought me this man as one who was perverting the people; and here I have examined him in your presence and have not found this man guilty of any of your charges against him. Neither has Herod, for he sent him back to us. Indeed, he has done nothing to deserve death. I will therefore have him flogged and release him." Then they all shouted out together, "Away with this fellow! Release Barabbas for us!" (This was a man who had been put in prison for an insurrection that had taken place in the city, and for murder.) Pilate, wanting to release Jesus, addressed them again; but they kept shouting, "Crucify, crucify him!" A third time he said to them, "Why, what evil has he done? I have found in him no ground for the sentence of death; I will therefore have him flogged and then release him." But they kept urgently demanding with loud shouts that he should be crucified; and their voices prevailed. So Pilate gave his verdict that their

demand should be granted. He released the man they asked for, the one who had been put in prison for insurrection and murder, and he handed Jesus over as they wished.

As they led him away, they seized a man, Simon of Cyrene, who was coming from the country, and they laid the cross on him, and made him carry it behind Jesus. A great number of the people followed him, and among them were women who were beating their breasts and wailing for him. But Jesus turned to them and said, "Daughters of Jerusalem, do not weep for me, but weep for yourselves and for your children. For the days are surely coming when they will say, 'Blessed are the barren, and the wombs that never bore, and the breasts that never nursed.' Then they will begin to say to the mountains, 'Fall on us'; and to the hills, 'Cover us.' For if they do this when the wood is green, what will happen when it is dry?"

Two others also, who were criminals, were led away to be put to death with him. When they came to the place that is called The Skull, they crucified Jesus there with the criminals, one on his right and one on his left. Then Jesus said, "Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing." And they cast lots to divide his clothing. And the people stood by, watching; but the leaders scoffed at him, saying, "He saved others; let him save himself if he is the Messiah of God, his chosen one!" The soldiers also mocked him, coming up and offering him sour wine, and saying, "If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!" There was also an inscription over him, "This is the King of the Jews." One of the criminals who were hanged there kept deriding him and saying, "Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us!" But the other rebuked him, saying, "Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? And we indeed have been condemned justly, for we are getting what we deserve for our deeds, but this man has done nothing wrong." Then he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." He replied, "Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise." It was now about noon, and darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon, while the sun's light failed; and the curtain of the temple was torn in two. Then Jesus, crying with a loud voice, said, "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit." Having said this, he breathed his last. When the centurion saw what had taken place, he praised God and said, "Certainly this man was innocent." And when all the crowds who had gathered there for this spectacle saw what had taken place, they returned home, beating their breasts. But all his acquaintances, including the women who had followed him from Galilee, stood at a distance, watching these things.

Now there was a good and righteous man named Joseph, who, though a member of the council, had not agreed to their plan and action. He came from the Jewish town of Arimathea, and he was waiting expectantly for the kingdom of God. This man went to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus. Then he took it down, wrapped it in a linen cloth, and laid it in a rock-hewn tomb where no one had ever been laid. It was the day of Preparation, and the sabbath was beginning. The women who had come with him from Galilee followed, and they saw the tomb and how his body was laid. Then they returned, and prepared spices and ointments. On the sabbath they rested according to the commandment.

# A REFLECTION FROM FR. PERRY

“God is eternally new. He compels us to push forward and start over, to make changes, go beyond the familiar, move toward the fringes, and beyond. He leads us to places where humanity is most wounded, where men and women seek an answer to the meaning of life, where they look beyond shallow appearances and conformism. God is not afraid!”

Pope Francis, *A Gift of Joy and Hope*



I can still remember sitting on the cold concrete floors in the small chapel at the guest house of the Santa Rita Abbey near Sonoita, Arizona in May 2017. I had been struggling for years with indecision rooted in the sense that I was not going down the right road. I had walked away from a dream academic job (with tenure) at San Diego State University the year before because I sensed God might be calling me to pursue ordained ministry. But I didn't, and instead worked my way into a job with a tech-focused startup company.

Sitting on the chapel floor that night, I wondered if I would ever get the courage to try. So many doubts filled my mind. What if I didn't make it through the process? Worse, what if I *did* make it through the process only to find out I wasn't cut out for it? I sat there for hours that night and had one of the hardest cries of my life. As much as I would like to say that the doubt and fear that had weighed me down just disappeared in that moment, the truth is that they did not. Instead, for maybe the first time in my life, I felt the courage to allow the Spirit to do something new in me.

Change is not easy, and the thought of taking a risk on something big and important is sufficient to make most of us (myself included) shy away. But when it comes to making these changes, Pope Francis is absolutely right: Those are the very places that God *wants* to lead us despite our fear and hesitation. We are all in the process of being made new, and the work of getting there requires us to move beyond our comfort zone, to see the image of God in the faces of those we encounter every day, and ultimately to *do something about it*.

This is the story of the New Creation inaugurated at Christ's resurrection when the power of sin and death were no longer able to separate us from our place in God's Kingdom. We sense it in our hope that the world truly can be a better and more compassionate place. We live it in our determination to make a place for all at Christ's Table. We experience it in our willingness to reach forth our hands in love to bring the knowledge of God's love to a broken and weary world. And at All Saints', we see it in bins full of clothing for our neighbors at Central High School or in the hygiene supplies we're collecting (with the support of our Day School fifth graders) to help our friends at Nourish Phoenix.

This Easter, let's lay aside our fears—about the world or about our own inadequacy—and instead let's have the courage to live into God's New Creation. You can help if you bring something to church with you to support one of our outreach projects into our community. **But don't stop there: bring a friend too.** Let them know that All Saints' is a place that is courageous and caring and that they will find a community of love and compassion here. Because we are doing more than sharing clothing or toothpaste: We are participating in God's work of making all things new, seeing things on earth look just a little bit more like heaven.
